Visit to RCO Library

On April 13 a necessarily small and select group of members visited the Library of the Royal College of Organists, which is currently housed in modern but small archival facilities in the Attwood Building (not *that* Attwood) within the Perry Barr campus of Birmingham City University.

The College's Library is as old as the College itself (founded in 1864 by Richard Limpus). From modest beginnings it has grown over the years into a Library of great distinction, whose comprehensive specialist holdings of organ and choral music and books are known across the world.

The Library supports organists, choral directors and scholars of the organ and organ music in their work; it complements and supports the RCO educational programmes, and it provides resources for those preparing for its examinations.

We were shown examples of the Library's contents by Andrew McCrea, Director of Academic Development at the RCO, and by Frances Pond, the Librarian. In temperature (low) and high-tech equipment (fascinating), the main Library room almost resembled a mortuary, but this sterile environment housed an overwhelming wealth of treasures.

Currently, the holdings comprise over 60,000 titles. There are books on the organ (its history, construction and repertoire), acoustics, architecture, technical textbooks, studies of composers, books on music history, and related subjects. There is an enviably comprehensive collection of music for organ solo, multiple organs, and organ(s) with other instruments (together with selected performance material) in historic original editions, facsimiles, and contemporary publications, besides a large collection of vocal music both sacred and secular from Dufay to the present day.

The recordings range from vintage 78s to CDs, and the holdings on microfilm include access to some of the College's most valuable manuscripts presently on loan to the British Library.

The College Library is also a repository for a number of significant collections, including the Parratt Papers, the Sowerbutts Collection, the Dalton Bequest, the Cruden Collection, the Aprahamian Collection and, more recently, the David Sanger Collection. The College is also the custodian of the Susi Jeans Archive and The Organ Club Library.

Our grateful thanks go to Andrew and Frances for guiding us with such enthusiasm around this amazing collection of organ-orientated materials. The Library is available for use by non-members of the RCO by appointment, and RCO members know that they are entitled to visit and borrow (as I myself have previously done).

Fund-raising recital

Association members recently gathered at Edgbaston Old Church for an evening to celebrate the music of Max Reger (*d* 11 May 1916) and some Birmingham-based composers, played by association members. Michael Jones introduced the items, with his own contributions played on the church's excellent grand piano. The object of the evening was to raise funds not only for the church's Organ Appeal, but also for our **Leonard Gibbons Fund**, which supports young organ students.

John Siresuk opened the proceedings with a spirited rendering of *Toccata Festiva* by BOA Past-President Andrew Fletcher – one of two living composers in the evening's programme. Christopher Cipkin next played Reger's *Benedictus*, a challenging piece in organ management with its extended *crescendo*, and rapid *diminuendo* – not aided by the very dry acoustic of the Old Church. Michael Jones then played *Two Pieces (From My Diary)* by Reger, the sonority of the piano sounding well for these two contrasting pieces.

David Griffiths, the church's resident organist, played *Largo & Double Fugue (Lesson in E)* by Barnabas Gunn, who was the first organist of St Philip's Birmingham (now the Cathedral). This was an attractive 2-stave piece very much in the early English style. Michael Jones returned to the piano to play three contrasting pieces; *September*, *Reverie* and *Green Magic* by Christopher Edmunds who, during the 20th century was organist at Aston parish church and also a tutor at the Birmingham School of Music.

Next we heard two pieces by Dr Cyril Christopher, organist at the old Carrs Lane Congregational Church and on the staff of Birmingham School of Music. The first of these for organ, *Homage Hymn* was played by David Griffiths; the second for piano, *Soliloquy*, played by Michael Jones, was to my ear reminiscent of Debussy. David then played *Canzonet* by Herbert Wareing, one time organist of Edgbaston Old Church, in late Victorian style featuring the *Clarinet* stop. Callum Alger, a Conservatoire student, currently organist at St Thomas, Stourbridge, played Max Reger's *Melodia*: a subdued piece, perhaps not what one would consider 'typical' Reger! David Griffiths played the concluding pieces; first by George (Theophilus) Miles, another tutor at the Birmingham School of Music, *Preludes on 'Sussex Carol' & 'Palestrina'*, both with slightly quirky harmonies. Then the *Prelude on 'Picardy'* by John Joubert – an atmospheric piece, but in typical Joubert style, with a very angular ending. Finally a *Coronation March* (for Edward VII) by Herbert Wareing – dare I say an amusing piece with some sections sounding more like an outing to the seaside than a coronation!

It was very interesting to hear these pieces, especially having the use of both piano and organ. However with the possible exception of Reger's *Benedictus*, most have not stood the test of time to enter the mainstream organ repertoire. The church kindly provided refreshments, and there was second-hand music on sale to help further boost the Leonard Gibbons Fund. Our thanks to all the players, but especially to David Griffiths & Michael Jones for organising such an interesting evening that raised over £200 for the Fund.
